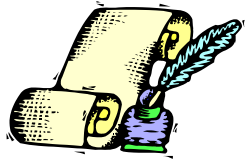

## Affordable Housing and Infrastructure Forum



On the morning of April 11, the League co-sponsored a forum on the future of affordable housing and infrastructure in San Diego in the absence of redevelopment. Co-sponsors included C-3, Common Cause, Partners for Livable Places, the Urban Land Institute-San Diego/Tijuana Chapter, the San Diego Housing Federation and the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce. The event was held at the First United Methodist Church in Mission Valley before approximately 100 people.

Betsy Morris, Principal of EMA Advisors and former Executive Director of the San Diego Housing Commission, served as program moderator. In her opening remarks she emphasized the present state of the housing crisis in San Diego for low income households. Thirty-four percent of working families now spend more than half of their income on rent, and workers in the hospitality industry spend approximately 2/3 of their income on rent. In the State of California there is now \$1.5 billion less available for affordable housing than in previous years due to the elimination of redevelopment funding and because most bond monies previously approved for housing have been exhausted.

Mike Burnett, a local architect and small developer, spoke of the importance of innovation and creativity in designing housing that can be affordable to a wide range of income levels. He designs, develops and retains ownership of his projects, thereby retaining complete control throughout the process. His projects have a number of common elements which include:

- Utilizing small, left-over parcels and designing the project to fit within the existing neighborhood;
- Working within what the zoning and development regulations allow in order to avoid costly deviations, rezoning, and other discretionary permits;
- Developing only the number of units that can be accommodated without having to include a parking garage which greatly increases costs;
- Emphasizing mixed use and mixed income projects,

and

- Respecting any buildings on the site at the time of design and try to incorporate them into the design.

He illustrated these principles with projects he has done in Golden Hill, Lemon Grove and San Marcos.

Keynote speaker State Assembly Majority Leader Toni Atkins began her remarks by emphasizing that we need to be making smart investments in people and infrastructure. She noted that California leads the nation in homelessness with **22 percent of the nation's** homeless and 12 percent of the population. However, she believes that we can eliminate homelessness in California by 2015 by leveraging state funds more effectively to generate affordable housing for the homeless. SB 391, the Homes and Jobs Act sponsored by Senator DeSaulnier, would authorize a \$75 recording fee on most real estate transactions, generating approximately \$500 million annually. The primary opposition to the bill is from the real estate industry who object based on philosophical grounds. Proposition 41 would reallocate \$600 million of bond funds which had previously been approved by the voters for single family housing for veterans. However, this money has not been spent. Proposition 41 would reallocate these funds for multi-family housing for veterans.

Another important bill, AB 1733, would authorize a free identification card for homeless people so that they could obtain key services. Finally, Assembly Member Atkins emphasized the importance of integrating improvements such as solar heating into housing and integrating support services with housing for veterans and other homeless populations.

Nico Colavita, retired professor of planning at San Diego State University, spoke about Land Value Recapture which allows public jurisdictions to capitalize on the land value increases experienced by private landowners resulting from plan updates and zoning changes







or infrastructure and public facilities. A variety of public or community benefits can be provided by **“capturing” part of the land value increase**. Among the benefits that can potentially be provided include:

- Affordable and workforce housing;
- Transportation Demand Management measures such as ride sharing, shuttles, flexible work hours, working at home, etc.;
- Historic preservation measures including the ability to transfer development rights from one historic site to another in order to preserve the historic site;
- Social services and creative arts;
- Enhanced open space and streetscape;
- Quality pedestrian and bicycling connections; and
- Shared parking solutions.

Land Value Recapture requires a strong local market demand in order to work because there needs to be a **significant increase in land value to “capture.”** Community benefits can either be negotiated as is done in Vancouver and Santa Monica or authorized in plan documents such as a general or community plan. San Francisco uses the plan based technique. San Diego has applied the concept only in downtown through the former Centre City Development Corporation (CCDC), but there may be potential to apply it in some other communities through community plan updates or development agreements.

Claudia Cappio, Executive Director of the California Housing Finance Agency and Acting Director of the California Department of Housing and Community Development was the final speaker. She stressed that housing production in California is not even close to keeping up with demand and that the regulatory framework created by the state needs to be streamlined in order to facilitate housing production. She stressed three major points

- The connection between housing and healthcare is vital. Mental health is now considered an important component of healthcare. Wrap-around health services closely coordinated with housing are essential.

She has worked hard to create strong ties between housing and healthcare.

- Good supportive housing is essential. It is vitally important to get the homeless off the streets and into the correct social service channels.
- A strong, coordinated entry strategy for the homeless to receive the services that they need to enable them to function independently is essential.

In her role as acting director of the Department of Housing and Community Development, she is implementing the Sustainable Communities Strategy requirement created by SB 375 in 2012 which requires regional transportation agencies to include a strategy in their regional transportation plan to reduce greenhouse gas emissions while taking into account regional housing needs, transportation demand and resource protection. She is trying to provide funding for regional agencies to prepare the strategies and to create a framework to assure that the funds will be spent correctly and in accordance with the priorities specified in the legislation. Ms. Cappio concluded by emphasizing that the state has a responsibility to demonstrate how tax dollars can be spent wisely.

As moderator, Betsy Morris concluded the day by identifying several **“takeaways”** that she had learned from the various speakers:

- Specific plans can help generate affordable housing.
- **SANDAG’s Smart Growth Incentive Program** can help to provide funding that can make affordable housing and infrastructure improvements feasible as part of a smart growth strategy.
- We can do affordable housing on site with help.
- We can end homelessness by 2015.
- There are ways to capitalize on unearned, enhanced land value for public benefits.
- We need to connect the dots and break down traditional silos to stress the interrelationships among such elements as housing, transportation, health and social services.
